Review & approve minutes	<u>April meeting minutes</u> - Cindy moved, approved		
Brampton City Update:	 Streets for People – City has posted signs for bike lanes scheduled for 14 roads (nearly 30km of new infrastructure coming to Brampton this season). Check out David's <u>delegation video</u> to Council regarding a question raised about Glenvale Blvd. – <u>Blog Post</u> 		
	 Bicycle Friendly Community – City will be applying for Silver status from Share the Road Cycling Coalition. We have made considerable improvements (eg. ATMP and bike lanes), since the City was awarded Bronze in 2017. Up for discussion at June 15th meeting of BCAC. 		
	3. Brampton Environmental Alliance (BEA), formerly Grow Green Network – David reported that this offshoot of Environmental Advisory Committee (BEAC), has received its letters patent for a not-for-profit organization and will be applying for charitable status. Volunteers are needed for some positions on the Board of Directors to get the organization off the ground. (President, Fund Raising, Secretary) The focus will be on key environmental issues for advocacy and community outreach. Next meeting is June 23 rd .		
	4. Centre for Community Energy Transformation (CCET) – David has been elected Chair of this new organization that will be transforming the City with deep energy retrofits to lower our carbon emissions – 30% by 2030; 50% by 2040; 80% by 2050. Sheridan College's District Energy is part of this organization. Transportation accounts for 60% of Brampton's emissions.		
	5. Multi-Use Path & Urban Shoulders – Lisa reported on her <u>correspondence with Staff</u> regarding the mostly gravel Mount Pleasant Trail, an important north-south trail connection in northwest Brampton. Lack of paving makes this inaccessible to wheelchairs, parenting pushing strollers, etc.		

	6.	and to cyclists and pedestrians in wet weather. Gravel cannot be maintained in the winter. Part of our ATMP deals with year-round maintenance so that commuting is possible. Discussion about DC (Development Charges) and if 80% can be covered. The urban shoulders that are being installed this year are legacy decisions. Going forward, bike lanes are the default, according to City policy. <u>Heart Lake Road & Countryside intersection EA</u> - Environmental Assessment announced in October on City Website. This is a traffic calming opportunity to install a roundabout at intersection of Heart Lake Road and Countryside Drive. Slowing traffic will help protect the wildlife on this road, situated within a Provincially Significant Wetland. HLR has been designated a Cultural Heritage Landscape. City has adopted the short-range action items of the <u>Design and Function Review of</u> <u>Heart Lake Road Corridor Report</u> : installing 2 more wildlife culverts, and wildlife fencing. The roundabout was the longer-range action item. Action : members to familiarize themselves with this link to <u>HLR background</u> which has links to all the relevant documents since 2011. Please open City link and click on <u>Notice of Study Commencement</u> and make comments known to Dave Hallman and/or Soheil Nejatian. Timeline for comments not specified, but sooner is better.
Regional Update:		Bike the Creek – Registration open June 1 st . Event runs virtually June 9-30 th . Register for chance at prizes. Routes range from 5-65km and include Brampton, Caledon and Mississauga. Dignitary ride for civic leaders on June 7 th . Routes stencil-painted in teams during week of June 7-11 th . Action: contact David if you are available to help. Registered cyclists use cellphones to read QR codes from signs along routes. Linked to content provided by 3 municipalities and TRCA. BikeBrampton has supplied 7 QR Code links to pages with our Cycling Safety Tip Videos. (See BB Projects #3 below) Take selfies and tag #bikethecreek21
		Regional Infrastructure – Lisa reported on her <u>correspondence with Staff</u> regarding Mayfield Road multi-use path. The best section is from Torbram to Airport Rd. "Elephant footprints" (pavement marking for crossrides) are being painted for cyclists. Given that planning times are long, BikeBrampton members should make Staff aware of issues and suggestions well in advance of construction schedules. An example of a positive outcome is Bovaird Trail crossing Hwy #410. An example where repeated reminders are required is cyclist detours for LRT construction. The Hwy #7 overpass at #400 in Vaughan is an excellent example of what is possible to make cyclists feel comfortable at interchanges.

	 Velo Canada Bikes – David reported that the cross-country checkup with 20 communities showed how progressive Brampton is for cycling infrastructure. Some communities are struggling to get any infrastructure and to get a 1-metre law passed. Charlottetown, BC Cycling Coalition, Guelph, Ottawa, EcoCounter, Hamilton, Calgary were on the call. Yvon reported passing law in Quebec is 1.5m and there are many signs informing drivers. Vision Zero is a must! Paint is an advisory only. Drivers can cross the yellow line. Discussion about need for explanation of the differences amongst crossrides, crossovers, crosswalks. Drivers do not have to be further tested once they receive their drivers license or renew their vehicle permit.
_	Etobicoke Creek Trail under #401 is open!!! – construction and landscaping completed.
8	Etobicoke Creek Trail – Kennedy Valley – under #410, 407 asphalt is being repaired. Paving starts May 27 th . Should be completed before Bike the Creek starts.
9	"Etobicoke Creek Trail Connector" – Wayne reported that on-road sections between ECT and Caledon Trailway has been named. It includes Kennedy Rd, Olde Base Rd, Heart Lake Rd. Olde Base will be having paved shoulders redone to widen for better safety.

- 5. Future Ground Network BikeBrampton has joined this grass roots not-for-profit organization that builds cooperatively on everyone's strengths. "supporting local action for a sustainable future". FGN is a "hub of groups taking action in their communities to secure healthier, more viable futures in the areas of climate justice, biodiversity, waste reduction and sustainable systems. Joining the network means connecting with organizers from other groups to share best practices, find inspiration and work together to achieve common goals. Network members will gain access to free training and digital tools to help mobilize their communities and amplify their voices." They offered us a free welcome session to discuss our needs, since we have a quorum of 3. Action: Additional BikeBrampton members are encouraged to sign up for this valuable resource.
- 6. Orangeville-Brampton Rail Trail Update (see January minutes for background.) Orangeville, Caledon, and Brampton are all interested in MUP for pedestrians and cycling. Another rail company has submitted a proposal to continue the line for trains, which would potentially be good for connecting goods and people movement inter-regionally. We need to advocate for 3 communities and Region of Peel to all contribute to make a rail trail happen. If it is sold to private enterprise, this opportunity will be lost. Caledon Trailway is perfect example of collective action for public benefit. Action: members to contact their Councillors to request the rail trail.
- 7. **Mentor training Action:** Lisa and Steve to finalize re-certification training for existing and new mentors. This will include advanced skills for the practicalities of cycling on-going.
- 8. **Protégé training Action:** Lisa with assistance from Steve and Kevin conducted two series of 4 ZOOM calls to educate protégés. Response was excellent. This series will be scheduled for 2021.
- **9. Bike-a-thon** Anu Sharma, PCHS Chair and President approached us re PCHS bike-a-thon activity for next year **Action:** discuss possible date and time in May. David to contact Ms. Sharma to start the organization of the event. carry forward to 2022
